She was caught after police investigating the footage recognised her from the programme.

her shoplifting list included pastries, biscuits, sandwiches and several cans of energy drink. She was given a caution for shoplifting.

for another theft eight days earlier at the same store, one mile from her two-bedroom council house.

On that occasion her haul included cakes, sandwiches and 'other foodstuffs' worth a total of £19.50.

A spokesman for Kent Police said Cole was given a police caution on March 1 for two counts of theft.

He confirmed that she was identified by police officers who recognised her from her appearance on This Morning last month as they scanned CCTV footage of her leaving the Sainsbury's store.

Cole says she has applied for

numerous jobs, but has only ever managed to land part-time work as a dinner lady for nine months before being sacked for repeatedly turning up late.

She is reported to get benefits of £227 a week to support her and her ten-year-old daughter Lottie.

Cole appeared on This Morning alongside former Apprentice contestant Katie Hopkins, who told the show she would not employ a fat person.

Gesturing towards Cole, the businesswoman asked: 'Would I want to put someone in front of a client who looks like this?'

'Do they look dynamic? Do they

look disciplined? Do they look highly efficient? 'Well, no, speaking frankly. And therefore, Jay wouldn't be someone that I would employ.'

An estimated 7,000 Britons are considered 'too fat to work', costing the taxpayer more than £28million in benefit payments a year.

In another interview, Cole said: 'I'm a victim of fatism.'

'If I go to an interview, people just roll their eyes when they see me walk in - just because I walk in and I'm ten dress sizes bigger.'

'Fat people are treated differently and it's unfair. That's why big people can't get work. I am happy

with my size and I'm not ch just because companies won't me work.'

She continued: 'I want but people see me as a hire me.'

'I love being big and don't see why I should myself just so I can probably hate anyone who do more than what can, but we're not a that and have to be

'I need benefits. a single mum with my right.'

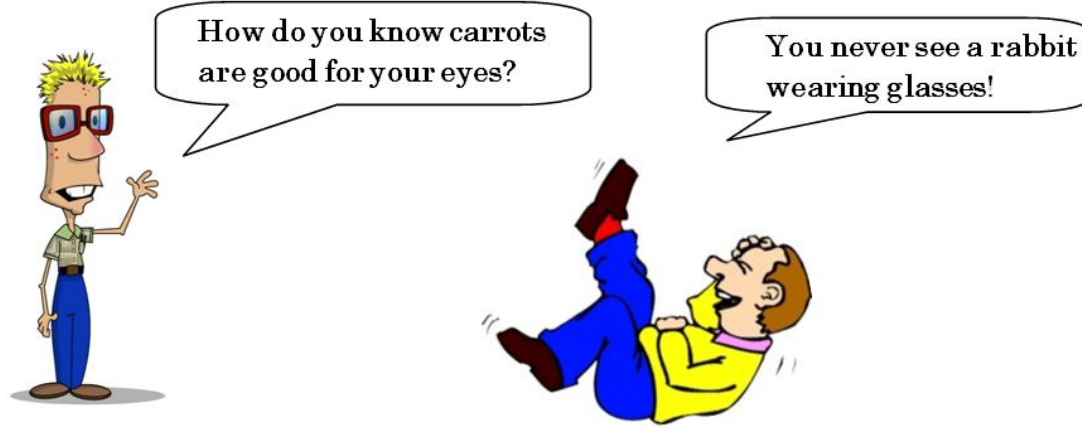

Sarcastic is a variant of the base 'sarcasm'.
